Since moving back to the US, she lives in and manages an Outreach House for Chinese Scholars at Harvard and MIT with Lee, David, her brother and her 96 year-old mother. She is grandmother now herself to five young children.

Miltinnie is an international speaker and published author. Her latest publication is a memoir that was published in China in 2012 and in the US in 2014. She is a graduate of Stanford University (BA in Philosophy) and Columbia University (MAT in Education).
